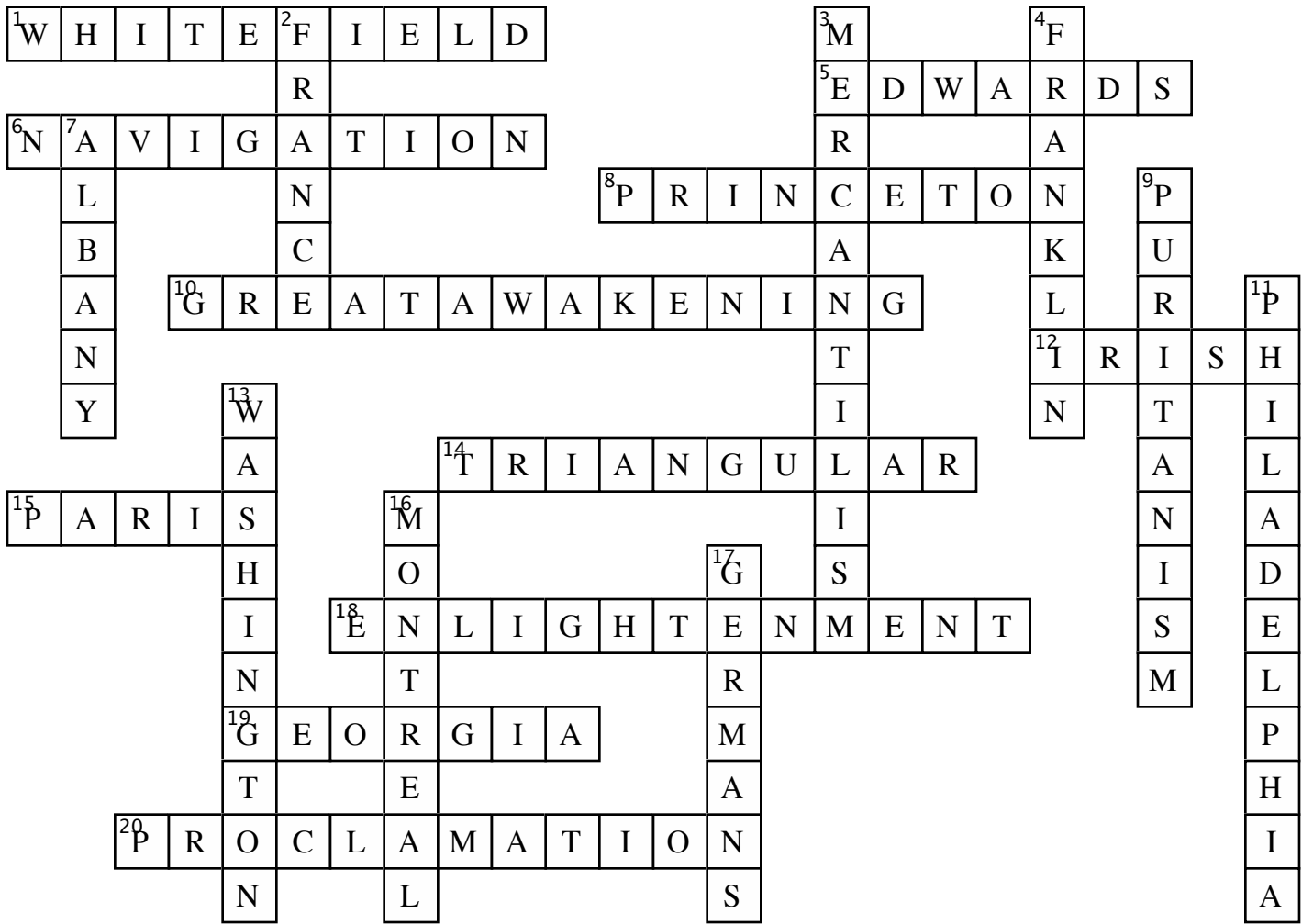


### Puzzle #3: 18th Century American Colonies

- Most persuasive speaker of the Great Awakening [WHITEFIELD]
- Great theologian of the 1730s & 1740s. His most famous sermon: "Sinners in the Hands of an Angry God" [EDWARDS]
- \_\_\_\_\_ Acts: a series of laws passed by Parliament restricting trade in the American colonies [NAVIGATION]
- New Jersey college established to train New Light pastors [PRINCETON]
- Religious revival of 1730s and 1740s [GREATAWAKENING]
- Scotch-\_\_\_\_\_: this ethnic group of individualistic settlers chose the backcountry of several colonies [IRISH]
- \_\_\_\_\_ trade: profitable link of Africa, Europe, the Indies, and colonies [TRIANGULAR]
- Treaty of \_\_\_\_\_: French give up claims to North American territories in 1763 [PARIS]
- European philosophical movement of the 18th century that emphasized reason. It had significant impact on American thought [ENLIGHTENMENT]
- Colony established as a refuge for debtors [GEORGIA]
- \_\_\_\_\_ Line of 1763: it prevented settlers from moving west of the Allegheny Mountains [PROCLAMATION]

- England's major European competitor for North American wealth and colonies [FRANCE]
- Economic theory that measured wealth from mother country's perspective [MERCANTILISM]
- America's Renaissance man: inventor, philosopher, publisher, statesman [FRANKLIN]
- \_\_\_\_\_ Plan of Union: 1754 meeting that proposed uniting English colonies in America. [ALBANY]
- The cold rationalism of this New England form of Christianity led to the outbreak of religious revival in the 1730s [PURITANISM]
- Capital of Pennsylvania and leading 18th century American colonial city [PHILADELPHIA]
- Young Virginia surveyor and lieutenant-colonel who gained fame in the French & Indian War [WASHINGTON]
- Victory here by England marked the end of French & Indian War [MONTREAL]
- European ethnic group that was second in size only to the English in 18th century Pennsylvania [GERMANS]
